## Final Comments \& Questions

The author is to be congratulated on his choice of topic as well as the way he leads the reader through all its complexities. There are a few issues which would need further clarification; these are listed chronologically below.
p. 2 In drawing a parallel between Europeans and Muslims, the author appears to be ignoring the distinction between nationality and faith. Would it not be more appropriate by way of comparison to look at the various factions within Christianity (Catholic, Orthodox and then Protestant with all its various sub-divisions)? p. 10 "Within 2-3 years there were 7-8 Uzbek families in America" does not strike one as being statistically impressive or even very meaningful. Is there not a misprint here?
p. 11 We are told Uzbeks from Afghanistan "had to move to different cities of America". But why America in particular? In other words, who introduced the element of compulsion here?
p. 36 What is meant by (a) "The USA, the World will have to take a strict control upon 'religions' running for politics"; and (b) "crimes on Islamic basis"?
